#### August Liaison Meeting

The August liaison meeting was held August 6<sup>th</sup>. This was the second liaison meeting with community manager Steve Foligno.

The first item of discussion was the drainage problems we had been having in various locations in the community. Lowering the level of the lakes and replacing the drain in cul -de-sac 35 seems to have eliminated most of the problems.

Painting the exterior of the club house is ongoing.

ELS has decided to repair the fence at the north end of the property instead of replacing it. The Brazilian Pepper trees seem to be doing the most damage to the fence so they will be trimmed and or removed.

The roof on the ballroom wing of the clubhouse will be replaced. Work should begin the last week of August. Due to this large expenditure, a number of needed repairs and updates are being postponed until 2014. Some of these items are: new carpet in card room, activity room, billiard room and craft room; road sealing; shuffleboard courts; bocce court repair.

The air conditioners in the Pub and clubhouse need repair. ELS is working with an air conditioning contractor.

The ballroom floor is scheduled to be stripped, cleaned and waxed over the August 30-September 2 week-end.

The Tiki huts were treated with fire retardant and refinished with marine varnish.

A new form to be used for residents' concerns was discussed.

New automobile and golf cart stickers that incorporate the owner's cul-de-sac number were discussed. No date was set for replacing the existing stickers.

A key system for the pool should be ready to roll out in 4-6 weeks. Under this system, the pool fence will be locked at all times. Pine Lakes residents will be given keys so that they can access the pool. A hefty fee will be charged to replace a lost key. Residents are reminded that according to our prospectus and covenants, guests are to be accompanied by their resident host when using our amenities.

A long discussion ensued about the very poor job Ameripride is doing. No one in the community is happy. Steve agreed to talk to the president of Ameri-pride.

We still continue to have problems with dogs. Residents are reminded that their dogs cannot annoy their neighbors with continual barking. Also dogs must be on a leash at all times. Electronic collars are NOT substitutions for leashes. The leash law is also a Lee County ordinance.

Liaison meetings are held each month. Residents are encouraged to inform their homeowners board members of items they would like to have discussed in these meeting.

#### FMO President Updates Legal Issues Involving the Prospectus in Leased-Land Home Sales

I recently received a letter from the Davis Basta Law Firm, P.A., summarizing a case that was appealed by a park owner. It is important that all manufactured home owners in Florida understand the Appellate Court's opinion that was issued.

Ms. Cashin of Tara Woods argued originally that she was never provided her seller's prospectus and that if she had been she would never have entered into a different one with the park owner. The lower court agreed that the park owner should have given her the option and provided her with the seller's original prospectus.

The Appellate Court did not agree. This Court held that the park owner has no obligation to provide a seller's prospectus and may provide a prospective purchaser with a new approved prospectus. In signing a "lifetime lease", the Court stated that the document became the only contract between the parties because the Prospectus was merely a disclosure document. Ms. Cashin may request a rehearing or ask a higher court to review the opinion. I will keep you posted.

So what does this mean for prospective purchasers? You are still entitled to rely on your seller's prospectus. However, a park owner does not have the duty to inform you of the terms contained in the seller's prospectus. It is up to the prospective purchaser to know that there may be a more favorable option contained in the Seller's prospectus. You should ask the seller to provide you with a copy of their prospectus. It is critical that a prospective purchaser read and understand every document that is signed, especially a Lifetime Lease. It is important to know that the Lifetime Lease is your main contract with the park. The Lifetime Lease can contain terms that are different from the Prospectus provided to you and will govern if you waive your right to rely on the prospectus. If you do not agree with the terms of the Lifetime Lease relating to the manner in which rent will increase, you need to negotiate such terms with the park owner prior to executing the Lifetime Lease.


Pine Lakes is hosting the meeting and it is open to all FMO members and non-members. If you are not a member, no one will try to recruit you, but applications for membership will be available.

#### Lake Algae on the Decline

"Lake Masters" is the name of the new lake management company employed by ELS for the 2013 summer season. Your editor had the opportunity to talk with spray technician "Kevin" from the company as he drove his spray rig around the second fairway lake on August 7.

Kevin was placing 50 lbs. of copper sulfate in his 70-gallon tank. He was about one-eighth of the way around the lake. The algae band around the lake shrunk by about two-thirds over the next ten days. Each rainstorm drove the algae below the water surface and the band that resurfaced was smaller each day.

Kevin and his spray rig came back on August 21, as I am writing this. It appears that the copper sulfate is reducing the mass of the algae.

Judy Hale is leading our effort to seed the lakes with grass and vegetative-eating carp. The carp will arrive soon and we hope it will add to the cleanup.

"We just came in for a normal doughnut and coffee, and some pretty girl came over and asked, 'Do you want \$1,000?'" 78-year-old Roy said.





#### What's new up north!


We've read various articles about, when as a snowbird, its time to pack up and head North. Our trip back this year was a rather uneventful journey but when we arrived, a rather pleasant surprise awaited us on our front patio wall.

We share our front patio with our next door neighbor which is separated by a short wall and the wall comes around to form a tee shape in front of both patios, mine and my neighbors.. Where the wall meets at the tee, Sandy has a flower box and she clears out most of the dead flowers before we leave for Florida and is left with some debris.

This year after we unloaded the car, with some help from our daughter and granddaughter, there was more debris in the corner on the patio floor than usual. This prompted Sandy to check it out, which was when she looked in the flower box to find a nest and 9 (nine) eggs under a small amount of very soft feathers. What a surprise find. All these eggs and no mother. What could happened to the mother we wondered, certainly these eggs were not abandoned and left to their own demise!!

Later that evening a large black and gray feathered duck came flying in and landed on the ledge and hopped into the flower box upon the eggs. Well, we were glad to see little miss home maker back to finish her job! Now we had to have a closer look. She (mama duck) didn't seem to be afraid of us but instead I'm sure was wondering who are these creatures and what are they doing so close to my home. She never moved, except to lower her head a little, if we got too close.

Our neighbor, who seems to know her way around duck land, tells us the gestation process takes about 28 days and



these eggs are already getting pretty big. Every day along about 5:30pm mama duck flies away for about an hour or so and returns to keep them warm overnight.

Now, this box as I said is on top of the wall about 3 feet in the air. We are told that when these ducklings hatch, we will need to pick them up and put them on the ground. Lord knows if mama duck will be around when this happens. She may not want us to mess around with her little ones. Fortunately, we have a small creek across the court yard from us and that's where we will be leading them. They say that when you lift them at birth they will follow you wherever you go as if you were the mother. I think Sandy will be better at this than I would. I have taken pictures of the nest and will send them along with this article. Maybe there will be room somewhere for one.

Some time went by and soon there was what we thought, some unusual restless fluttering movement by mama duck. Our neighbor said that when the mother starts this type of activity, these eggs will soon be ready to hatch. At this point we didn't really know what we were going to do when they did emerge, or how were we to find out. Suddenly from the window, I see a small head pop up in the corner of the nest and knew we had to get some professional help because of their home being on a three foot high wall and this being our first experience of this kind.

As with most things we rely on these days, I went to the computer to try to find some answers. You can always find answers if you ask the right questions, right. Well usually you can. In this case I went to You tube looking for duck birth and came upon this video. It was a film of someone holding a slightly cracked duck egg in the palm of his hand as the egg was beginning to crack open. He held it there tapping the egg with his finger in an effort to help it open, until a duckling was finally produced.

Later I found out that these eggs are protected and what I was watching was actually illegal.

In my search I also found the phone number of the Michigan Wildlife species agency and gave them a call. As is often the case in these organizations, there was a message to leave my name, my concern and they would return the call as soon as possible. So I told the phone that my newly acquired duck was in the process of giving birth and we needed some advice and we need it in a hurry for one of her babies is beginning to emerge.

By now my neighbor with some duck behavioral background was with Sandy and I in the kitchen and we were all staring out the plate glass door wall at the flower basket. Then we seen another furry little head pop up beneath mama duck's feathers and were wondering if we had called the right place.

Suddenly the phone rang and a ladies voice on the other end was asking me what was happening. After I told her she said that quite often all the eggs will not hatch so don't worry if you only see a portion come forth.

I told her they were in the process of birthing and she said that when the mother is laying the eggs they don't come out all at once so they won't all hatch at the same time, but usually one after the other, which seemed to be what was happening.

Our concern was that the nest being on a three foot high ledge could they survive a fall of that distance and what should we do, if anything, to help the birthing process happen without the babies falling to the ground or maybe not even being able to get out of the flower box at all.

There was about a 6 inch wall from the nest to the top rail of the box for the ducklings to overcome. The Lady said we needed to get the box off this rail and on to some level ground to allow the babies to maneuver the flower box wall and not have far to descend. They surely would break some bones falling from that height since they are not like birds and cannot fly at birth. (continued on page 20)

It looked like it was time to move the flower box, so I thanked her for the advice and said we would call back if we encountered some trouble we couldn't handle. My neighbor and I got at each end of the box and gently lifted it up with mother still in it. We began walking it around the wall and onto a lower level. Mama's wings were fluttering but she stayed on her nest until we were about a foot from setting it down on our brick paver walkway.

Suddenly big wings started to flutter and she hopped out of the box and stood on the walkway watching us gently set the box on the ground. When the box was on the ground the newborns began to flap their little wings in an effort to escape their birthing place. There were four (4) that hatched out of 10 eggs. Three of them got out quite easily climbing over the short wall but I had to slightly tip the box to allow, for what seemed to be, the runt of the flock to make its first landing.


Once on the ground, mama duck started waddling down the court yard pavement. I don't know how this happens, but these newborn knew what order they should be in when the parade started. There seemed to be no argument about who will be first or second, but in single file formation their start was seamless, as they all went waddling around our building to be on their own and never to be seen again.

You would think that this is the end of the story but we still had six unhatched eggs in the box and Sandy, who had gotten very attached to our fowl family, was of the impression that mama duck may be coming back to finish hatching the other offspring. As I said earlier, the lady from the wildlife association said it would be very unlikely that this would happen. After mama has her babies, she forgets the other eggs, because they are not her babies, only eggs. This didn't keep Sandy, whose motherly instincts were raging, from peering out the window all afternoon waiting for mama to finish her job with those six forgotten eggs.

So we waited for a period of time for Mama Morais' sake to dismantle our flowerbox and replant for the upcoming summer season. That being said, Mama duck never did come back. #### Bee Problems

By Howard Harrison

Each summer, about now, Pine Lakes home owners have experienced bees moving a swarm into their garages or onto their shrubs or trees. This occurs widely. The local paper reports 5,000 to 7,000 hives needing relocation in Lee County at this time of year. The paper lists Keith Councell of Councell Farms as a resource person if you need help. The paper lists the following prevention and response tips in case of problems.

#### **BEE AWARE**

To prevent bees from moving into your home.

- Do a perimeter check for gaps around all utility connections, telephone lines, pipes, wires, valve and meters, the air conditioning unit, hose bibs and soffits. Look for cracks in the facade and vulnerable areas.
- Seal gaps or cracks with "liquid nails" a caulking compound that doesn't break down or dry out. Expandable foam is another option. Steer dear of the ones that contain insect repellent, as it might be bitter for some insects, but not for bees.
- Get rid of cavities that they find so inviting. For instance, leave large, empty gardening pots on their sides. When they are left upside-down, they create an ideal nesting site for bees. Tree cavities also are inviting. The tree should be removed, or the openings should be properly covered with tight-jnesh pool screening.
- When you monitor your perimeter, notice whether there is a bee or two drifting in and out of a certain location. Because bees have scouts that constantly come and go to transmit information to the hive, "if you see one coming and going, you have a hive," says bee expert Keith Councell.
- Follow your nose. If you detect a concentrated scent of something blooming in the neighborhood - cab- bage palm, melaleuca or Brazilian pepper - that's a hint that the little pollinators (and honey makers) are active.


#### If you discover a hive on your property:

- Do not seal the gap or the crack facing outside. They will come inside your home or garage instead.
- Do not wait to see if it will go away. It will only grow larger.
- Do not try to poison with hornet and wasp spray because it's not scientifically designed for bees.
- Do not attempt to remove the hive on your own.

#### **5 Ways to Ease Muscle Soreness**

You have been working out hard, consistently getting on your bike, hitting the pavement, going for a swim or whatever your chosen activity may be. Consequently, you feel accomplished and healthy...but your muscles are sore.

Sore muscles are believed to be caused by inflammation of the muscle fibers due to prolonged or intense usage. The soreness is a message from the body to take action with your health by nurturing yourself.

Here are five natural remedies that can relieve sore muscles and allow you to get back in the game.

#### Rest

Give yourself a break! When we rest, our cells, skin, muscles, joints and brain all regenerate. Resting the body, or participating in less strenuous activity until soreness subsides, will refresh you.

Taking a couple of days off completely from your regular activity may be the best solution for you. If the soreness is especially intense, take a full week off. The more intense your physical routine, chances are the longer it will take for the soreness to subside.

The body is powerful; it will efficiently heal itself when given the opportunity to address the challenged areas. Rest can renew and re-energize you.

#### Ice than Heat

Icing is most effective immediately following the onset of soreness. It cools inflammation and swelling, and relieves aches and pain.

It is best to ice within the first 48 hours of feeling discomfort. Give yourself an "ice massage" by moving the ice around for 15 to 20 minutes along the sore muscles.

Allow 45 to 60 minutes to pass before icing again. Overicing can further damage tissues and even cause frostbite. Wait until the skin feels warm again then repeat as frequently as you wish. Freeze a few ice packs so that they are ready to go when you need them.

Begin using heat after the swelling and inflammation have decreased, which could take two or three days. Heat helps in aiding circulation, relaxes tight muscles, and reduces pain. Heat is usually better for chronic pain, such as arthritis, or for muscle relaxation. Apply heat to sore areas for 20 minutes, up to three times a day. You can use a hot compress or take a warm bath or hot shower.

#### Stretch

Be flexible. Sore muscles can take several hours to develop. At first your muscles may feel tight and contracted with limited mobility. Stretching elongates the muscles, reducing muscle tension and increasing range of motion.

As you improve your flexibility you will be able to take your stretching deeper. However, if you force a stretch too far then you may feel pain, which is a sign to relax and stretch less intensely.

If you sense that a muscle is strained, then avoid stretching altogether, as it may strain it further. Opt for ice and rest instead.

#### Arnica Gel

The flower heads of the arnica plant are used medicinally to make gels, creams and ointments for topical use. Arnica should never be ingested because of the potential effects on the internal body. The arnica plant contains a chemical called helenalin, a sesquiterpene lactone, which has anti-inflammatory properties. (easy for you to say)

Arnica gel can ease sore muscles and relieve pain by reducing inflammation.

#### Supplements

Muscle tightness and soreness can be caused by a deficiency of certain minerals or amino acids in the body. The use of supplements may help relieve sore muscles by introducing more of these components that assist muscle relaxation and protein synthesis. Consult a health professional before taking any supplements.

**Magnesium** is the mineral that the body uses to relax muscle tissue after contraction. When the ability for muscles to return to a relaxed state is impaired, muscle tightness and soreness can result. Magnesium can be purchased at health food stores and added to your beverage of choice. Taking it before bed can promote a restful sleep.
